COUNCIL NOTES

Concerns over cemetery upkeep raised

A delegation from the Hillsdale Cemetery Advocacy Group came before council to express concerns about the cemetery. Spokesperson Kim Bridekirk said the group is concerned with the maintenance of the site and also about the drilling of holes in the monuments to accommodate the Veteran Leaf markers. Further, the group would like council to consider amending the cemetery by-law that allows plastic solar lights.

Ms. Bridekirk said a petition is being circulated in support of group's concerns.

In response, Mayor McCharles said that a student had been hired to augment the upkeep of the cemetery and that any changes to the by-laws must be discussed first.

Truck traffic decreasing

Mrs. Jackie Spearman addressed council recently, noting she had noticed a decline in the amount of heavy truck traffic traveling along Petrolia's main street. Mrs. Spearman and many other Petrolia residents have been alarmed by high number of trucks using the street instead of bypassing the town, posing a safety threat and raising environmental impact concerns. A petition has been circulating regarding this issue.

Mayor McCharles said a letter had been sent to Suncor regarding the trucks' usage of the main street and the Ministry of Transport intended to do spot checks to ensure the trucks were not avoiding the weigh scales.


